Patty Willard's Retirement on January 30, 2026

Patty Willard's last day with the County was Friday January 30, 2026 after 30 years and two months. She began her journey on November 13, 1995 working with David Townsend in the Public Works Department dealing with trash and landfill. As the County began to grow so did her role becoming the Assistant to the Director of Public Works. As times changed so did the method in which the County dealt with trash, closing the landfill, opening transfer stations and shipping the trash outside the County. We've come full circle with the opening of the Great Oak Landfill. The County began Community Development. Patty assisted 53 homeowners with remodeling their homes with handicap accessibility and improving functionality. She was also involved in the construction projects for the County including the Register of Deeds, Department of Social Services, the first Detention Center project and the new Courthouse. Her involvement with the Courthouse became a daily project from design to the open house on July 1, 2002.

On August 1, 2008, Patty moved her talents and skills to the Tax Department. She began as the Sales Analyst monitoring all the sales/deed transactions to build data for the Schedule of Values. With Patty's eagerness to learn more about the appraising of real property, she began taking educational courses with NCDOR and the School of Government to become a County Real Property Appraiser I in November 2009. Then in August 2016 Patty successfully completed the requirements to become a Real Property Appraiser II. She also completed coursework for County Personal Property Appraiser I.

Patty exhibited the ability to learn and apply new skills with the ever-changing software. She demonstrated accuracy and thoroughness. She promoted quality and monitored field data to ensure the accuracy of the property records.

Patty says it is time to go on with some of her own projects. She plans to spend more time with her five grandchildren and travel as much as possible.

Retirement Bio – Patricia Hughes

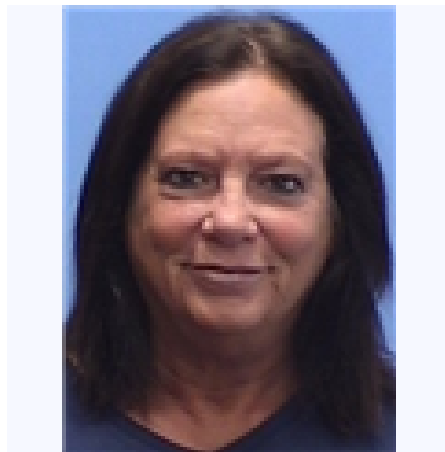

The Randolph County Board of Commissioners met in regular session at 6:00 p.m. in the 1909 Randolph County Historic Courthouse Meeting Room, 145 Worth Street, Asheboro, NC. Chairman Darrell Frye, Vice-Chairman Kenny Kidd, Commissioner David Allen, Commissioner Hope Haywood, and Commissioner Lester Rivenbark were present. Also present were County Manager Zeb Holden, Assistant County Manager/Finance Officer Will Massie, Assistant County Manager William Johnson, County Attorney Ben Morgan, and Clerk to the Board Dana Crisco. Bishop Michael Trogon from the Randolph County Sheriff's Office gave the invocation and everyone recited the Pledge of Allegiance. The meeting was livestreamed on YouTube.

Approve Agenda

On motion of Kidd, seconded by Rivenbark, the Board voted 5-0 to approve the Agenda as amended, as follows:

Public Comment Period

Pursuant to N.C.G.S. §153A-52.1, Chairman Frye opened the floor for public comment and closed it after everyone wishing to speak had done so. County Attorney Ben Morgan read aloud the Public Comment Rules of Procedure.

Jonathan Burris, 4362 Black Mountain Rd., Asheboro, spoke of his support for the Board's decision to dissolve the Library Board of Trustees.

Mark Wilburn, 1134 Heathwood Dr., Randleman, handed the Clerk a petition signed by his parishioners who support the Board's decision to dissolve the Library Board of Trustees.

Penny Stewart, 3757 Lynn Oaks Dr., Trinity, was a school nurse. She stated that children face bigger issues than reading a book about gender identity.

Judith West, 339 Gregg St. Archdale, has used the library for over thirty-five years. The Library Board of Trustees followed all of the rules.

Rachel Haggerty, 3137 Grange Hall Rd., Asheboro, thinks that the book, *Call Me Max*, is not appropriate for children and is not appropriate for an Elementary School library.

Charlie White, 482 Fairfax Ct., Asheboro, said the action of the Board to dismiss the Library Board of Trustees was not appropriate. He wishes to have the former Library Board of Trustees reinstated.

Jennifer Swanner, 6000 Westhaven Ln., Trinity, is opposed to the dismissal of the Library Board of Trustees. She feels the Library Board of Trustees did their job appropriately.

Susie Scott, 516 W. Kivett St., Asheboro, is concerned about the Bylaws and Ordinance. She asked for the decision to be tabled until the next meeting.

Todd Nance, 1995 Parks Crossroads Church Rd., Ramseur, is here to support the Board in their decision to have the Library Board of Trustees dismissed.

Jennifer Eagle, 7696 Union Grove Church Rd., Seagrove, asked about the process for choosing new Library Board of Trustees members. She thinks the Bylaws and Ordinance are not transparent.

Jo Burgess, 121 Wright Country Rd., Ramseur, came to the meeting in December for the Library Board of Trustees. She is a former teacher and does not think the book is appropriate for children.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING A REQUEST FOR THE NORTH CAROLINA GEODETIC SURVEY TO SURVEY, MARK, AND MAP THE BOUNDARY BETWEEN RANDOLPH AND GUILFORD COUNTIES

WHEREAS, over the years, due to changes in mapping technology and the removal of boundary markers, the exact location of the boundary between Randolph and Guilford Counties has become uncertain, with each County having a slightly different opinion as to the location; and

WHEREAS, uncertainty as to the boundary affects each County's provision of services and taxation of property for residents and businesses located near the boundary; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to NC General Statutes 153A-18(a), if two counties are uncertain as to the exact location of the boundary between them, they may request in writing that the North Carolina Geodetic Survey (NCGS) survey, mark, and map the boundary, and each county may appoint a special commissioner to supervise the surveying, marking, and mapping of the boundary; and

WHEREAS, NCGS would perform such work at no cost to each County; and

WHEREAS, the County Managers of Randolph and Guilford recommend that each County's Board of Commissioners request that the boundary between the Counties be surveyed, marked and mapped by the NCGS in order to determine the exact boundary; and

WHEREAS, approximately 24 parcels cross Randolph County's boundary with Guilford; and

WHEREAS, this survey will only confirm the location of Randolph County's common boundary and not Randolph's common corners with Davidson or Alamance counties.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Randolph County Board of Commissioners that:

1. As a result of a coordinate system shift and the removal of physical boundary markers, the Board of Commissioners finds that Randolph County's boundary with Guilford County is uncertain.
 2. The Board of Commissioners hereby appoints Amanda Dawkins, GIS Analyst/Programmer.
 3. The Board of Commissioners hereby requests the North Carolina Geodetic Survey to survey, mark, and map the boundary between Randolph and Guilford Counties.
 4. This resolution shall be in full effect upon its adoption.

WHEREAS, Social Workers positively impact the lives of millions of Americans daily, in hospitals, schools, child welfare agencies, community, centers, and within the federal, state and local governments nationwide;

WHEREAS, for more than a century, Social Workers have worked to improve human well-being, advocate for justice, and support everyone's basic needs; and

INASMUCH AS, Social Workers select this profession out of a deep commitment to help uplift, defend, and transform the lives of people, their families and communities; and

WHEREAS, the 2026 theme, "Social Workers: Uplift. Defend. Transform," shines a light on the resolute spirit of social workers who transform lives while bringing hope, healing, and justice to the communities they serve - especially in times of profound change and challenges; and

WHEREAS, Social Workers are on the frontlines defending vulnerable populations, including those facing discrimination or poverty, while uplifting vital social safety net programs and ensuring the rights of everyone; and

Distribution Request for Randolph County School System (RCSS)

Will Massie, Assistant County Manager/Finance Officer stated that this fund is from the Lottery system. These funds cannot be used for special projects, only repairs or renovations for classroom space.

Dr. Steven Gainey said this is a newer program with the Lottery system. He likes this aspect of the NC Lottery Funds. This money will be used to replace the roof at Coleridge Elementary School. The request must be approved by both the Board of Education and the Commissioners.

On motion of Allen, seconded by Haywood, the Board voted 5-0 to approve the request of the Randolph County School Board for Lottery Repair and Renovation Funds in the amount of \$878,000 and approve the associated Budget Amendment, as follows:

Sign Ordinance in Unified Development Ordinance (UDO)

Kim Heinzer, Planning Director, stated the recommended changes requested by the Commissioners from February are now incorporated in the Sign Ordinance.

On motion of Kidd, seconded by Allen, the Board voted 3-2 with Rivenbark and Haywood opposing to 1) adopt the Ordinance Amending the Unified Development Ordinance and the Associated Consistency Determination and Finding of Reasonableness and Public Interest Statement and 2) add a \$250 Specific Sign Request Fee to the Randolph County Planning and Zoning Fee Schedule.

Purchase of three 2026 F-150 Police Responders

Chief Deputy Steven Nunn stated the Sheriff's Office is requesting approval for the purchase of three (3) 2026 Ford F-150 Police Responder's. The intention is to acquire these vehicles through the North Carolina Statewide Vehicle Contract, which governs procurement for State agencies,

community colleges, universities, and select local government entities, ensuring cost-effective and fair acquisition of goods and services.

Under the North Carolina Statewide Vehicle Contract, Deacon Jones Ford of Clinton has been awarded the bid (25-11-0912) as the designated supplier. The total cost for the purchase of three 2026 Ford F-150 Police Responder's amounts to \$142,099.02. It is worth noting that the funding for these acquisitions has been included in the Sheriff's Office budget for the 2025-2026 fiscal year.

The acquisition of these three 2026 Ford F-150 Police Responder's will significantly enhance the operational capabilities of the Sheriff's Office, particularly in terms of law enforcement tasks that require reliable and robust vehicles. In accordance with the Randolph County Purchasing Policy, which mandates that purchases exceeding \$90,000 require approval from the Board of Commissioners, the Sheriff would like authorization to proceed with this procurement.

Commissioner Kidd requested a list of current vehicles. Chief Deputy Nunn stated he would send that to the Board.

On motion of Rivenbark, seconded by Allen, the Board voted 5-0 to approve the purchase of three (3) Ford F-150 Police Responders in the amount of \$142,099.

Purchase of Glock's

Chief Deputy Steven Nunn stated that the Randolph County Sheriff's Office requests authorization to expend \$295,188.39 from Law Enforcement Restricted Funds to purchase duty weapons and associated equipment. The purchase includes:

- 225 Glock 17 pistols
- 225 duty holsters compatible with the Glock 17
- 225 red dot sights compatible with the Glock 17

This acquisition will standardize patrol weapons, improve officer safety and accuracy, and reduce long-term maintenance and training costs.

Chairman Frye inquired about a trade-in value. Chief Deputy Nunn stated that turning in the weapons and accessories will generate a credit from the vendor.

Commissioner Allen confirmed that the trade-in credit would go back into Law Enforcement Restricted Funds. Chief Deputy Nunn agreed that it would.

Vice-Chairman Kidd asked if the red dot optic technology was being used agency wide. Chief Deputy Nunn said it was and it is now built stronger to withstand use in law enforcement.

On motion of Allen, seconded by Haywood, the Board voted 5-0 to approve the expenditure of Law Enforcement Restricted Funds for the purchase of Glock's in the amount of \$295,188 and approve the associated Budget Amendment, as follows:

Voluntary Agricultural District (VAD) Update

Bobby Allen, Chairman VAD, said the district added eleven new parcels to the VAD program in 2025 totaling 147.5 acres. Eighty-eighty (88) acres were removed from the program in 2025. The total acreage in the program is currently 20,190 acres. That makes 15% of all agricultural acres (131,300 ac) in Randolph County in a VAD. He also noted the correction to the acreage number in the memo that was in the packet.

Commissioner Allen stated that the average age of farmers in Randolph County is 56.7 years old.

Ordinance and Bylaws of the Library Board of Trustees

Zeb Holden, County Manager, stated that the Ordinance and Bylaws in the packet are the most current version. He asked for feedback from the Board on the documents.

Ben Morgan, County Attorney, said changes from the original documents were made to look similar to other Boards. He used the Board of Health as an example. That board has 3-year terms and term limits.

Commissioner Allen stated that the trustee from Randleman should start with a 3-year term and the Ramseur trustee should have the 2-year starting term due to their circulation numbers.

Commissioner Allen asked how collection of applications will be handled. He mentioned the possibility of having an updated procedure. Mr. Holden said applications could be more specific to the Boards. There is no current list of potential candidates. The applications could be more easily accessed by putting them on the County website.

Commissioner Allen and Haywood agreed that they would like to have more representation and participation.

On motion of Rivenbark, seconded by Kidd, the Board voted 5-0 to adopt the Ordinance and new Bylaws with the change of the Randleman trustee having a 3-year starting term and the Ramsuer trustee having a 2-year starting term on the Public Library Board of Trustees.

Family Crisis Center Urgent Request for Funding

Ms. Nikki Jenkins, Executive Director of the Family Crisis Center, spoke to the Board regarding the agency's urgent need for funding. There has been a 60% increase in shelter usage. The loss of Federal grants in the amount of \$600,000 for FY 2025-26 has left them with not enough

funding through the current year. They are coordinating fundraisers but are in need of \$75,000 immediately.

District Attorney Andrew Gregson said the courts have seen a similar increase in assaults on children. There has become a greater need for the specialized services to help them.

Commissioner Haywood commented on how critical it is to have those services offered in Randolph County. Before that, children had a long wait to see a specialist at Brenner's Hospital. It is more beneficial for the children to remain in their home county.

Ms. Jenkins said they serve both children and adults. Grants for FY 2026-27 have already been awarded to cover those costs.

Commissioner Haywood said that all non-profit entities have faced Federal cuts. Even churches are short on funds. She personally supports them when she can.

Vice-Chairman Kidd asked about the upcoming fundraiser. Family Crisis Center Board Chairman Aundrea Azelton said they are selling tickets for a chicken dinner fundraiser.

On motion of Haywood, seconded by Kidd, the Board voted 5-0 to advance the FY 2026-27 appropriation in the amount of \$75,000 to the Family Crisis Center.

County Manager's Update

There were no updates.

Commissioners Updates

Chairman Frye stated that he had recently been to the NACo Conference in Washington, DC where Federal funding cuts had been discussed. He also spoke of a potential State legislation on property tax reform. The North Carolina Association of County Commissioners (NCACC) is working closely with lawmakers to be sure they understand the potential impact to Counties.

Closed Session

At 7:38 p.m., on motion of Kidd, seconded by Rivenbark, the Board voted 5-0 to go into Closed Session pursuant to N.C.G.S. §143-318.11(a)(3) to consult with an attorney employed by the public body in order to preserve the attorney-client privilege between the attorney and the public body, which privilege is hereby acknowledged.

Return to Open Session

At 8:05 p.m., Open Session resumed.

Proclamation

WHEREAS, in fiscal year ending June 2025, 1,390 reports were accepted by Randolph County DSS child protective services; and

WHEREAS, child abuse and neglect is a serious problem affecting every segment of our community, and finding solutions requires input and action from everyone; and

WHEREAS, our children are our most valuable resources and will shape the future of Randolph County; and

WHEREAS, child abuse can have long-term psychological, emotional, and physical effects that have lasting consequences for victims of abuse; and

WHEREAS, protective factors are conditions that reduce or eliminate risk and promote the social, emotional, and developmental well-being of children; and

WHEREAS, effective child abuse prevention activities succeed because of the partnerships created between child welfare professionals, education, health, community- and faith-based organizations, businesses, law enforcement agencies, and families; and

WHEREAS, communities must make every effort to promote programs and activities that create strong and thriving children and families; and

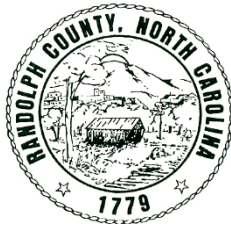
Re: Establish DEQ Barrier Removal Grant Project Fund

The Division of Water Resources (DWR) of the North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality (NCDEQ) announced that \$153,000 in financial assistance was awarded to the Randolph County Soil and Water Conservation District for the Watkins Aquatic Barrier Removal on Reed Creek Project.

This grant will provide financial assistance to remove the Watkins Dam to provide approximately 7.6 miles of upstream aquatic passage, restore approximately 250 feet of stream and plant 0.8 acres of riparian buffer along Reed Creek.

The total project is estimated to be approximately \$326,000, with the remaining funding arranged through the Piedmont Conservation Council. There is no County cash match required.

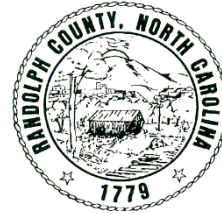

Design/Engineering for the Harlan Creek Pedestrian Bridge connecting the two sections of the Ramseur Rail Trail section of the Deep River State Trail for a total of 1.5 miles. This bridge will also add .75 mile to the 3.25 mile Franklinville to Ramseur Rail Trail sections recently connected via the Sandy Creek Bridge for a total of 4 miles connected. Re: Transfer of Rural Water Infrastructure Contingency to Water Fund

In May 2023, the Board of County Commissioners reserved a \$6 million portion of the ARPA Revenue Replacement allocation for future water projects. However, in July 2025, the County also received major state funding from the NC General Assembly for water and sewer projects. This funding will be our primary source for upcoming water and sewer improvements.

As the original reserve allocation is not as needed for capital needs as planned, another option would be to utilize it in the annual Water Fund instead. This will reduce the current year and future year's impact on the General Fund and strengthen the resources in the Water Fund.

We recommend that the original reserve funds be transferred to the annual Water Fund to cover the debt service payments on the PTRWA water treatment plant and operational costs for a few years. By that time, we expect to be able to begin selling our allocation of treated water to municipal partners.

RESOLUTION BY THE RANDOLPH COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS AUTHORIZING EXECUTION OF OPIOID SETTLEMENTS WITH SIX REMNANT DEFENDANTS, ASSOCIATED PHARMACIES, INC. (AND AMERICAN ASSOCIATED PHARMACIES); J M SMITH CORPORATION; LOUISIANA WHOLESALE DRUG COMPANY, INC.; MORRIS AND DICKSON CO.; NORTH CAROLINA MUTUAL WHOLESALE DRUG COMPANY, INC.; AND UNITED NATURAL FOODS, INC. AND THE ACCEPTANCE OF ADDITIONAL FUNDS BETWEEN THE STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS OF PROCEEDS RELATING TO THE SETTLEMENT OF OPIOID LITIGATION

WHEREAS more than 41,500 North Carolinians lost their lives to a drug overdose from 2000-2023; and

WHEREAS the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has estimated the total economic burden of prescription opioid misuse alone in the United States to be \$78.5 billion a year, including the costs of healthcare, lost productivity, addiction treatment, and criminal justice involvement; and

WHEREAS certain counties and municipalities in North Carolina joined with thousands of local governments across the country to file lawsuits against opioid companies, manufacturers, pharmaceutical distributors, and chain drug stores to hold those companies accountable for their misconduct; and

WHEREAS a new proposed national opioids settlement (collectively “the Six Remnants Defendants Settlement”) has been reached in litigation against Associated Pharmacies, Inc. (and American Associated Pharmacies); J M Smith Corporation; Louisiana Wholesale Drug Company, Inc.; Morris and Dickson Co.; North Carolina Mutual Wholesale Drug Company, Inc.; and United Natural Foods, Inc. as well as their subsidiaries, affiliates, officers, and directors (collectively “the Six Remnant Defendants”) named in the Six Remnant Defendants Settlement; and

WHEREAS our multi-district litigation national counsel has negotiated and prepared a Combined Subdivision Participation and Release Form (“Combined Participation Form”) to provide for the equitable distribution of the proceeds of the Six Remnant Defendants Settlement; and

WHEREAS by joining the Six Remnant Defendants Settlement, and executing the Combined Participation Form, the state and local governments maximize North Carolina’s share of opioid settlement funds to ensure the needed resources reach communities, as quickly, effectively, and directly as possible; and

WHEREAS it is advantageous to all North Carolinians for local governments, including Randolph County and its residents, to sign onto the Six Remnant Defendants Settlement, and the Combined Participation Form, in order to demonstrate solidarity in response to the opioid overdose crisis, and to maximize the share of opioid settlement funds received both in the State and Randolph County to help abate the harm; and

WHEREAS both the Six Remnant Defendants Settlement and Combined Participation Form direct resources over multiple years to local governments on the front lines of the opioid overdose epidemic while ensuring that these resources are used in an effective way to address the crisis;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Randolph County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the County Manager to execute, on behalf of Randolph County, the necessary documents to enter into opioid settlement agreements, as set forth herein, with the Six Remnant Defendants Settlement, and to execute the Combined Participation Form, and to provide such documents to Rubris, the Implementation Administrator, subject to a pre-audit certificate thereon by the County Chief Financial Officer, if applicable, and approval as to form and legality by the County Attorney or Associate County Attorney.

WHEREAS, the North Carolina Division of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (NCDJJD) provides a service array of intervention/prevention programming; clinical and crisis intervention services; residential and transitional living programs; juvenile court and community supervision services; and short and long term facility confinement services that impact Randolph County youth and families; and

WHEREAS, the NCDJJD provides community supervision and case management services through Juvenile Court Services that includes referrals to evidence-based local delinquency intervention and prevention programs to reduce recidivism; and

WHEREAS, the overarching mission of NCDJJD and the local Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC) is to provide diversion programming to ensure the protection of the community and rehabilitation of youth offenders in the least restrictive, most age-appropriate way possible; and

WHEREAS, Randolph County has a vested interest in ensuring that juveniles receive access to community-based intervention and prevention programs as a first response to (1.) prevent Juvenile Justice system involvement or interrupt Justice system trajectory once involved and (2.) reduce costs incurred by the County to house youth in a secure detention facility; and

WHEREAS, JCPC-funded government and non-profit sectors are experiencing inflation that has outgrown existing legislative JCPC allocations, preventing the County from funding a robust service array of delinquency intervention and prevention services to supplement the County's public safety initiatives; and

WHEREAS, NCDJJD and the County have enjoyed a decades long partnership and see the value of ensuring that youth and families have access to supportive services provided by JCPC-funded

intervention and prevention programs and other programmatic responses in the NCDJJD service array that directly impact Randolph County youth and families; and

WHEREAS, the Randolph County JCPC has been a good steward of legislative dollars by funding impactful evidence-based intervention and prevention programs while also braiding in county revenues and resources to expand programmatic reach; and

A RESOLUTION OF THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF RANDOLPH COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA, SUPPORTING THE FINDINGS OF THE PIEDMONT TRIAD REGIONAL WATER AUTHORITY WATER AND WASTEWATER UTILITY REGIONALIZATION STUDY AND COMMITTING TO WORK TOWARD A REGIONAL WATER AND WASTEWATER SOLUTION

WHEREAS, the **Piedmont Triad Regional Water Authority (PTRWA)** is a North Carolina municipal corporation organized pursuant to Section 162A-3.1 of the North Carolina Water and Sewer Authorities Act to provide regional utility services to its members and the broader Piedmont Triad region; and

WHEREAS, reliable and sufficient water and wastewater infrastructure is essential to protecting public health, supporting economic development, complying with state and federal regulatory requirements, and accommodating future growth within the entire Piedmont Triad region; and

WHEREAS, the **North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality (NCDEQ)** has identified significant present and future water and wastewater infrastructure capacity challenges across the region through its regional planning efforts; and

WHEREAS, to better understand and address these challenges, PTRWA completed the **Water and Wastewater Utility Regionalization Study**, which evaluated existing infrastructure, projected growth, regulatory constraints, capital needs, and opportunities for enhanced regional coordination and service delivery within both Randolph and Guilford Counties; and

WHEREAS, the Study identified the **County of Randolph** as a jurisdiction facing current and/or future water and/or wastewater capacity limitations that could impact growth, resiliency, affordability, and long-term sustainability; and

WHEREAS, the Study concludes that **regional solutions and collaborative utility planning and service delivery approaches** can provide operational efficiencies, cost effectiveness, regulatory compliance advantages, and improved long-term system reliability for participating jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS, the **Board of Directors of the Piedmont Triad Regional Water Authority** has formally adopted the Study and expressed its commitment to facilitating regional water and wastewater solutions in partnership with affected municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the **Board of County Commissioners** recognizes the value of regional cooperation and desires to explore solutions that best serve the long-term interests of its residents, businesses, and stakeholders.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the **Board of County Commissioners** of **Randolph County** that:

1. **Support of Study Findings:** The **Board of County Commissioners** hereby acknowledges and supports the findings and conclusions of the **Piedmont Triad Regional Water Authority Water and Wastewater Utility Regionalization Study**, including the identification of regional capacity needs and the benefits of collaborative, regional utility solutions.
2. **Commitment to Regional Collaboration:** The **Board of County Commissioners** commits to working cooperatively with the **Piedmont Triad Regional Water Authority** and other regional partners to further evaluate, plan, and pursue feasible regional water and/or wastewater solutions that address identified capacity needs.
3. **Good-Faith Participation:** This commitment includes participation in discussions, planning efforts, and evaluations of governance, financial, operational, and infrastructure options that may support a regional approach, recognizing that any future agreements or implementation actions shall be subject to separate approvals by the **Board of County Commissioners**.
4. **Communication of Support:** A copy of this resolution shall be transmitted to the **Piedmont Triad Regional Water Authority** as an expression of **Randolph County's** support for regional planning and collaboration.

Subject: Consider Interlocal Agreement with City of Asheboro

Randolph County continues to invest in projects that 1) improve access to public water and sewer systems and 2) strengthen our municipal partner's water and sewer utilities. The Interlocal agreement under consideration is a significant step forward in this regionalization effort.

The proposed Agreement memorializes a partnership and establishes responsibilities for Randolph County and the City of Asheboro in two important areas. First, public water will be connected to eastern Randolph County via new and upsized water lines. And second, public water and sewer systems in the Seagrove area will be made significantly more sustainable with infrastructure investments and management oversight.

Approval of this Agreement by the Randolph County Board of Commissioners and Asheboro City Council signifies a unified effort to address known utility issues in our communities. Not only will these projects protect our citizens, they will also ensure the capacity for growth in the future.

Staff recommend approval of the Interlocal Agreement with the City of Asheboro.

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this ____ day of _____, 2026 by and between the County of Randolph, a government entity and a political subdivision of the State of North Carolina (hereinafter referred to as “County”), and the City of Asheboro, a North Carolina Municipal Corporation (hereinafter referred to as “Asheboro”) and collectively referred to as the “Parties.”

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, both the State of North Carolina and Piedmont Triad Regional Water Authority (“PTRWA”) have, within the past 3 years, completed studies indicating the necessity of regionalization of utility resources; and

WHEREAS, regionalization strengthens utilities by creating redundant, resilient, and efficient systems, with greater capacity for growth and increased predictability and sustainability of customer rates; and

WHEREAS, the County has received a funding allocation from the North Carolina General Assembly to be used for water and sewer improvements throughout the County; and

WHEREAS, the County, with this funding, intends to strengthen municipal utility systems and promote interconnectivity and regionalization; and

WHEREAS, Asheboro received \$55,000,000 from the State of North Carolina to assist in the construction of a water transmission line along Highway 64 (the “Line”) to service the Chatham – Siler City Advanced Manufacturing Site; and

WHEREAS, the \$55,000,000 from the State of North Carolina has been allocated, but is insufficient to complete Phase 1 of the Line; and

WHEREAS, the County has committed to upsizing 11,000 linear feet of the Line at an estimated cost of \$773,800 for future capacity to serve the eastern portion of Randolph County; and

WHEREAS, the estimated cost of completion of Phase 1 of the Line is \$16,447,202.20; and

WHEREAS, the construction of Phase 1 is crucial to the provision of water to eastern Randolph County; and

WHEREAS, the County is currently constructing a water line from PTRWA to Asheboro, at an estimated cost of \$9,000,000; and

WHEREAS, the County has an allocation of 1.25 million gallons per day of treated water from PTRWA; and

WHEREAS, the Seagrove-Ulah Metropolitan Water District was duly formed pursuant to Article 4 of Chapter 162A of the North Carolina General Statutes on October 2, 1989; and

WHEREAS, the Seagrove-Ulah Metropolitan Water District has an existing connection and water purchase and wastewater treatment agreement with Asheboro; and

WHEREAS, the Seagrove-Ulah Metropolitan Water District is unable to continue to provide services in a manner that is professionally and economically feasible given its number of customers, and the Seagrove-Ulah Metropolitan Water District Board wishes to partner with a municipal system for a sustainable future.

NOW, THEREFORE, for valuable consideration and the mutual covenants exchanged between the parties hereto, it is agreed as follows:

1. The County shall guarantee an amount not to exceed \$16,447,202.20 to Asheboro towards the construction of Phase 1 of the Line. Invoices shall be generated by the Contractor and certified by both Parties' representatives.
2. Asheboro agrees and warrants that up to the first 1.25 million gallons of water per day that flows through the Line shall be water purchased from the County's PTRWA water allocation. This is a bulk water sale and not a take or pay agreement. The County, in its sole discretion, reserves the right to redirect this portion of allocation to other municipal systems with notice, to be defined, to Asheboro, and any affected municipal system.
3. Asheboro agrees to purchase the water referenced in Paragraph 2 above at an initial Fiscal Year 2027 rate of \$3.30 per thousand gallons from the County, and the County agrees to sell said water at said rate to Asheboro, when the Line is put in operation, through a water purchasing agreement.
4. The County has initiated engineering and design to improve and upgrade a wastewater package treatment plant owned by the Seagrove-Ulah Metropolitan Water District. Estimated construction cost is \$4,500,000 to be paid by the County. The package plant is expected to be operational by December 2027.
5. Asheboro shall, within 18 months from the date of signing this Agreement, assume ownership, management, and control of the operation, maintenance, repair, replacement, and improvement of the Seagrove-Ulah Metropolitan Water District, a step towards the regionalization envisioned by the State and PTRWA.

6. In order to limit liability to Asheboro customers, Asheboro shall create a separate enterprise fund among its finances to manage the future Seagrove-Ulah Metropolitan Water District, until such time as it becomes financially sustainable to merge.
7. Beginning on July 1, 2026, and continuing until the change in ownership and management contemplated in this Agreement, Asheboro shall serve as Operator in Responsible Charge (“ORC”) for the Seagrove-Ulah Metropolitan Water District. The Seagrove-Ulah Metropolitan Water District shall remain responsible for all costs and liabilities until the change in ownership.
8. Beginning on the date of this Agreement, Randolph County shall assist the Seagrove-Ulah Metropolitan Water District in procuring services to complete an Asset Inventory and Assessment (“AIA”) study for its utility system to assist in the identification of its assets and to prepare for efficient change in ownership and management contemplated in this Agreement.
9. The County agrees that, should the construction of the Line cost less than \$16,447,202.20, Asheboro shall have the use of up to \$3,000,000.00 of the remaining funds, if any, for capital improvement costs identified in the AIA study that are associated with its assumption of ownership, management, and control of the Seagrove-Ulah Metropolitan Water District operations contemplated in this Agreement.
10. Subject to review and approval by North Carolina Emergency Management Commission, the County shall transfer to the Asheboro 100 acres of 10/70 development rights of the Back Creek Balance Watershed and 20 acres of 10/70 development rights of the unnamed tributary (UT) to Cedar Fork Creek Balance Watershed to Asheboro for the city to use in responding to Special Intensity Allocations requests within its land use jurisdiction.
11. The County and the City shall not be construed as joint ventures or general partners of each other, and neither shall have the power to bind or obligate the other Party except as set forth in this Agreement.
12. Neither Party shall transfer or assign its rights or obligations under this Agreement without the other Party’s prior written consent.
13. This Agreement shall be construed under the provisions of the law of the State of North Carolina. Any legal proceeding brought in connection with disputes relating to or arising out of this Agreement shall be filed and heard in the courts of Randolph County, North Carolina.
14. The County and the City hereby attest that they currently comply with and shall continue to comply with, for the duration of this Agreement, Article 2 of Chapter 64 of the North Carolina General Statutes (commonly referred to as "E-Verify").
15. In the event that any provision of this Agreement is determined invalid, illegal, or otherwise unenforceable, the validity, legality and enforceability of the remaining provisions shall in no way be affected or impaired thereby.

16. Each Party represents and warrants to the other as follows: (a) this Agreement has been executed by each Party's duly authorized representative; (b) it has full right, power, and authority to enter into the Agreement; and (c) the compliance with the terms of the agreement will not contravene the provisions of its charter, bylaws, or any agreement to which it is bound.
17. Any notice to be given under this Agreement will be in writing, delivered via (i) personal delivery, (ii) certified mail, return receipt requested, trackable mail, postage prepaid, or (iii) nationally recognized courier service, addressed to the parties and at the addresses designated below and will be considered effective (i) five (5) Business Days following the date the notice is placed, first-class postage prepaid, in the United States mail; (ii) on the day the notice is hand delivered; (iii) for certified or registered mail, the date on the return receipt; (iiiv) for commercial courier service, the date of delivery.

Subject: Randolph County Opioid Settlement Funding

In July 2023, The Randolph County Board of County Commissioners approved the first round of Opioid Settlement Fund applications. These applications provided funding to various opioid abatement strategies for three years, with the anticipation of accepting new applications in 2026.

The attached Spending Authorization Report Resolutions enable the Board of County Commissioners to fund ten opioid abatement proposals, utilizing Randolph County opioid settlement funds. These proposals come before the Board following an application process that involved review by a panel of citizens who personally or professionally have experience in Opioid Use Disorder.

Totaling \$1,800,000, the ten proposals for FY26-FY29 represent seven opioid abatement Strategies.
